FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Hello Dover Bay Community,

Our school is off and running into second semester and the transition between semesters has gone relatively smoothly. I appreciate the support of our grade eight families and the resilience of their children through the changes to our pods for semester two. we recognize that this has been a tough transition for many of our grade eights.

You will notice a **student wellness** theme to this newsletter. We have a variety of **In Person and Virtual family information sessions** on a variety of topics coming up soon. We know that we have students that

are actively involved in substance use on a regular basis. This substance use can happen at home, in the community, or at school. We are seeing a variety of issues connected to substance use with some new trends that are quite alarming. Connected to substance use is Vaping which previous newsletters have discussed. We have a large number of students that are struggling with their nicotine addiction. We have seen student use of vapes steadily climb at our school. We have also seen nicotine pouches being used by students while at school. The connection between vaping and substance use is real. We have students reportedly using Dab Pens that contain THC, as well as vaping THC with a regular vape. Students involved in these activities at school, are subject to the code of conduct and any use of drugs or alcohol comes with a mandatory suspension and referral to Discovery Youth and Family Substance Use Services. Depending on the issue the RCMP may also become involved and fines can be issued through the Cannabis Act. Dover Bay is not immune to the current opioid crisis and we have had students requiring first aid or ambulance calls due to distress that substance use has created. The March 4th session in our MPR will focus exclusively on substance use. We hope to see a good turnout for this session and the other three sessions that are being offered in person: March 4: Substance Use, March 5: Trauma, March 25: Mental Health, March 26 Safety. Along with the in person meetings we have four virtual parent sessions that are outlined in this newsletter.

Bullying and Harassment – Recently there has been conversation about Bullying at Dover Bay on the PAC Facebook page. Bullying and Harassment is an issue at Dover Bay as it is at all schools. These issues are being addressed on a daily basis at our school and often involve administrators, counsellors, CYFSW's, as well as other staff. That being said, I am certain that there are incidents happening on a regular basis that do not go reported. Reporting bullying incidents is critical. Our students can report issues to any staff member, directly to a counsellor administrator or indirectly though a conversation with a parent. We also have the ERASE Bullying

help line where these situations can be reported anonymously. We always work discreetly to ensure that the individual reporting is not targeted retribution. Our approach does not illuminate who reported the situation. We have successfully addressed a variety of bullying situations this school year. Often these situations are complicated and are not as simple as they may first appear. The important element is that we need to know. Having the courage to report when a bullying situation is observed or experienced is so important. Our Code of Conduct is Educative: Preventive or Restorative. When addressing issues we always look at the issue through those three lenses. Of course, bullying comes in a variety of forms and can often be experienced through social media. Any student that is experiencing bullying or harassment, even if the antagonist is not at Dover Bay, should report it to a trusted adult. Often the RCMP are involved in serious situations that may have a criminal element to the bullying. We work closely with Constable Staniforth who has a good way with our students.

~Understand what causes and maintains substance use disorder and needs.


~Increase your child's ability to make positive choices about substances.

Establishing Safe, Caring, & Respectful Digital Communities – Upcoming training February 28

Recommended for Parents/Caregivers/Grandparents and youth aged 10 and up as a way to facilitate the conversation of safe and caring use of technology at home and in the community. (60 minute session) This session covers all things digital, from how to be a good citizen. the criminal consequences of cyberbullying, and how to report and receive support in cases of sexting/sextortion. Some of the most prominent concerns currently surrounding use of social media platforms, smartphones, and artificial intelligence will be discussed.

Families will learn:

- Digital media habits, oversharing, and digital addiction
- The permanence of online posts/activity
- The significance of your digital tattoo in how others perceive you (e.g., sports teams, college admissions, and potential employers)
- The importance of caring for peers both online and offline
- Geo-locational settings and the dangers of social media and cell phone misuse
- The social and legal consequences of cyberbullying behaviour as well as possession and distribution of intimate images (sexting and sextortion)
- An anonymous student reporting tool that can help you and your friends stay safe both online and offline


BREAKFAST PROGRAM

ACTIVE VAPE SENSORS

Concerns around vaping in our student washrooms was a top concern in our recent Dover Bay School Goals Survey. Students have been feeling unsafe to use the washrooms for various reasons and encountering vaping students was the primary concern.



As of Monday, Dover Bay has active Vape sensors in our washrooms. These sensors will send a message to administration if vape is detected in a washroom.

Vaping is a health issue for those who vape as well as for students and staff who experience the vapors second hand. Vaping or smoking at school (Building and Campus) are breaking the Code of Conduct and students may receive a fine (Smoking Regulation Bylaw #7268) (Please see the December Newsletter for more

Semester 1 was an absolute blast with our outdoor education students! Since our last update in November students have been busy strengthening their leadership skills by working together to orienteer, fish, rock climb, and ski/snowboard safely.



Our senior students learnt how to belay their peers safely with 32 students attempting and successfully obtaining a belay certificate from the Romper Room!



Our senior students also celebrated their semester with either a day or an overnight trip to Mt. Washington skiing and snowboarding, focusing on group management and safety. The snow was fantastic in early January, and we had beautiful conditions every day we were there! Lastly, we finished the semester off with emergency response and first aid. 15 senior students successfully obtained a Canadian Red Cross – Standard First Aid & CPR/AED level C certification. 2024 IS A LEAP YEAR

History

To better understand the true origins of leap year we will need to turn back time, way, way back, a couple thousand years!

- The first traces of a 365 day calendar with a leap year was in the Egyptian Empire. The goal of the Egyptians was to create a calendar that mimicked the Solar Calendar allowing them to keep their seasons on track
- Fast forward about 3,000 years and Julius Caesar,
 Ruler of the Roman Empire became the modern day
 Father of Leap Year
- Caesar felt it was time to recognize that winter truly existed and created a 12 month 365 day calendar based off that of the Egyptians
- This new calendar was fabulous for a few years but it was slowly realized that the earth actually has 365.24 days per year as opposed to 365. To correct this, Caesar instituted a Leap Year once every four years to ensure the man-made and solar calendars stayed aligned
- Some cultures didn't have leap year on Feb 29th -instead February 24th occurred twice

Fun Facts

There are all kinds of leap day traditions and fun facts around this special day that comes every four years.

- 4 million people in the world are leap day babies
- Leap day babies are called leapers or leaplings
- There is a one in 1,461 chance of being a leap day baby
- Quite a few famous people were born on February 29th
- Every year divisible by 4 is a leap year
- But every year divisible by 100 is NOT a leap vear
- Unless the year is also divisible by 400, then it is still a leap year.
- There will be 8 years between leap years 2096 and 2104
- Women often choose this day to propose marriage to men
- Getting married in a leap year is considered bad luck in Greece, so one in five engaged couples try to avoid it

William Hall was the first Black Canadian to receive the Victoria Cross.


Harry Jerome was a Black Canadian athlete, who overcame a terrible injury, as well as racist attitudes in the Canadian Press to become an Olympic Champion.
