Hello Dover Bay Community, this is a great time of year and we have so many different opportunities for students happening that it is impossible to list them all. Our students are working hard in their courses as well as trying to balance all of the extra activities that happen in May and June. students, please try to keep your courses on track and reach out to your parents, teachers or counselor if you are feeling overwhelmed. Two pieces that I would like to reference in the principal section of this newsletter are listed below.

Relay for Life: The Student Council has there annual Relay for Life fund raiser, which is outlined later in this newsletter. This is one of the largest fund raising campaigns in Western Canada to increase cancer awareness. Each year our students set an ambitious goal to raise funds for cancer research and they always seem to meet or surpass their target. I am very proud of our students and staff for all of their planning and energy for this year's relay. I would like to thank our parents/guardians in advance for their support.

Cell Phone Procedure: Next year Dover Bay and NLPS will be navigating the new cell phone expectations as outlined by the Ministry of Education. Some in the media initially reported this to be a province wide cell phone ban, but this is not the case. Cell phone tolerance in schools will be clearly outlined and shared with families, students, and staff early next school year. Our school district is currently in the early phases of planning for what cell phone use will look like in schools. The early notion will be to gather some feedback from families, students and staff to help inform the direction for next year. It is my understanding that this will lead to consistency across the district regarding cell phone tolerance.

FROM THE LIBRARY



Re: Rotary Youth Exchange Program

Good morning Principals, school counsellors and international program teachers,

The 5 Rotary Clubs in Nanaimo and Lantzville are recruiting for our 2025/26 exchange year and are hoping you can help us get the word out to students who you think would be interested in Youth Exchange.

The Rotary Youth Exchange program is treated like a peace ambassador scholarship; the value is \$25,000.00 USD. You do not have to be from a Rotarian family to apply. Unlike other programs *Rotary covers nearly the entire cost* of the exchange which includes; room and board, school and a monthly allowance. Families are responsible for flights, insurance and spending money. A unique part of our program is that students spend time with three different host families, this helps them have different experiences and really immerse themselves into the culture.

We recognize that all families may not be able to afford these programs, Rotary will never turn away an interested student and have some funding options for those who qualify.

We are having an online information session on Monday June 3rd, 2024 @ 6:30pm for students in grade 8-11. Registration is required @ www.rye5020.org. This information session is for any interested students and their parents. We have two different programs; Short Term Exchange is where students spend a month in another country during the summer, the students' ages can be between 15-19 years old. Our Long Term Exchange program is where students leave in August and return in July, students need to be 16 by September 30th the year they leave and can be no older than 18 when they return in July. Graduating students can go on the short term program but not the long term program. Here is an overview of the timeline for the next available exchange year; Students would apply now with applications closing in late September, students have a local interview in October, District interviews in December, acceptance into the program in mid December, January thru April 2024 Online and in person orientations as well as Visa paperwork and language courses. Leave for exchange in August 2025 and return home in July 2026.

I have included some information about our program that you can easily email out to students. Please feel free to contact us to see how we can make this work.





WHAT'S INVOLVED?

The short term exchange is during the summer holidays, whereas those involved in the long term exchange leave August/September and return the following summer.
